The 2019 Softlink Australia, New Zealand, and Asia-Pacific School Library Survey

Participant Summary

Asia Pacific

Sample Size: 27

In 2019, there were 27 participants from the Asia Pacific region, representing the following countries:

> China - 2 Hong Kong - 10 India - 5 Japan - 1 Malaysia - 1

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Papua New Guinea - 2 Singapore - 3 Solomon Islands - 1 Thailand - 2

There were 5 primary/contributing, 4 secondary schools, 1 intermediate school, and 17 primary and secondary schools represented.

There was 1 Catholic school and 26 Private/Independent schools represented.

Background and Objective

The Australia, New Zealand, and Asia Pacific School Library Survey, conducted by Softlink on behalf of the school library sector, examines key trends and issues impacting school libraries. Points for analysis include annual school library budgets and staffing levels, as well as the use of digital resources in school libraries, school library services, and trends.

The results help to advocate the role of school libraries and library professionals to education decision makers, as well as through industry associations and networks.

This participant summary provides a statistical benchmark and overview for schools from the Asia Pacific region.

Further analysis of statistics and trends will be explored in the full 2019 Australia, New Zealand, and Asia Pacific School Library Survey Report, which will be available in early 2020.

Currency rates have not been adjusted; dollars are represented as equal within their respective budget locations.

Please note, sample sizes of less than 5 have not been included. In the instance of a sample size that is less than 5 for Intermediate schools, they have been included in the results for Secondary schools. Published October 2019




Changes in resourcing

Reported budget changes


Respondents were asked how staffing had changed from 2018 - 2019. The graph below shows reported staffing changes.



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Resourcing

Participants were asked if they think their library is adequately resourced, including budget and staffing. 37% of respondents said "no", 63% said "yes".

Participants were asked how many Qualified Teacher Librarians and how many Qualified Librarians work in their school. Note: this question asked for number of people that work in the library that hold these qualifications, not the number of hours worked.


The figure below shows the percentage of schools that reported Qualified Teacher Librarians and Qualified Librarians working in the library, and the number of each.

2019 School library services/objectives

Participants were asked to select up to 5 main services the library provides. Respondents were also asked to select up to 5 things they would like to do, or do more of, if they had more resources and/or time. The graph below shows the percentages of responses for both of these questions.

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The top 5 school library services reported by respondents were:

• Promoting and supporting reading for pleasure - 90%

Percentage of schools


- Developing and managing the schools resource collection - 80%
- Curating relevant information and resources to support topic based learning and curriculum 70%
- Developing or teaching information literacy programs or research skills programs - 65%
- Providing an engaging and welcoming space for learning and leisure 65%

The top 5 services respondents indicated they would like to do more of were:

- Developing or teaching information literacy programs or research skills programs - 60%
- Collaborating with other school departments 50%
- Providing student engagement and learning programs, for example study groups, code clubs - 45%
- Promoting and supporting reading for pleasure 40% Curating relevant information and resources to support topicbased learning and curriculum - 35%

2019 Future impacts

Participants were asked to select up to 5 main things they believe will impact school libraries in the future. The graph below shows the percentages of responses to this question.



In the Asia Pacific category, the top 6 things reported by respondents were:

- Increased technology integration 60%
- Digitisation of resources 60%
- Cloud-based technologies increasing library accessibility 45%
- Social media 35%
- Learning analytics 35%
- Curated online content 35%
